CCBRT marks the first ever International Day to End Obstetric Fistula in style!



When it was announced that 23rd May 2013 would be the first International Day to End Obstetric Fistula we knew that we would have to do something special to mark the occasion.

The commemoration started with a week long road trip from Bukoba to Dar es Salaam, where the team, in partnership with Vodacom and the Vodafone Foundation and accompanied by famous musician and Vodacom fistula ambassador Mwana FA, spread the message 'Fistula Inatibika! Fistula is Treatable!' in 10 regions of Tanzania.

The convoy were welcomed at their final destination, CCBRT, on International Day to End Obstetric Fistula, where they were

received by His Excellency, Dr Gharib Bilal, Vice President of the United Republic of Tanzania. A VIP delegation were then given a tour of our fistula facilities where they met patients currently being treated on the ward, as well as former patients now training at the Mabinti Centre.

Following the tour, guests took their seats on the construction site of the brand new CCBRT Maternity and Newborn Hospital. Officially opened by Ms Mariam Khan, Country Representative, UNFPA, the reception included speeches from VIPs as well as a performance of Kidole Kimoja, a song composed by 22 female artists especially for the occasion.



Children in Crossfire and UTV visit CCBRT Moshi



In May, CCBRT Moshi received a visit from Children in Crossfire (CiC). The delegation, including the Founder and Director of CiC

Richard Moore, were accompanied by a crew from UTV, the most popular TV channel in Northern Ireland.

The visit followed the lobbying of CiC and other NGOs in Northern Ireland to encourage the Northern Irish Government to increase their international aid budget in light of the G8 Summit, hosted in Northern Ireland this year. The aim was to profile the work being supported by NGOs from the UK and Ireland and the huge impact being made on the lives of children as a result.

Senator Mark Furner visits CCBRT



CCBRT received a visit from Senator Mark Furner this quarter. As a member of the Australian Senate, Senator

Furner was particularly interested to see CCBRT and the impact AusAID funding was having upon the lives of people with disabilities in Tanzania.

AusAID is currently supporting the work of the CCBRT Advocacy Unit in promoting accessibility and inclusion. Senator Furner was greeted by our CEO Erwin Telemans and was given a presentation on the progress and work of our Advocacy Unit, before taking a tour of the Disability Hospital to meet patients and staff.

Halliburton, the global oilfield services company, visited CCBRT this quarter with a donation of mosquito nets for patients at the Disability Hospital. The donation came to mark World Malaria Day and helps CCBRT to ensure that all of our patients can sleep safely without fear of contracting malaria.



Dr Yoni Barnhard, President of the Board of Kupona Foundation, visited CCBRT this quarter. During the visit Dr Yoni provided not only support with the strategic development of our maternal and newborn healthcare programme but also provided clinical support during his visit to one of the 16 facilities that currently participate in the Maternal and Newborn Healthcare Regional Capacity Building Programme.

A team from CCBRT attended World Vision's East Africa Regions process excellent summit in Nairobi. During the conference Emelda Lwena, Matron of CCBRT Disability Hospital gave a presentation on the implementation of visual management at CCBRT, giving insight on her experience as a nurse implementing these processes.

CCBRT advocates for inclusion at the Goat Races 2013



One of the biggest days in the Dar es Salaam calendar, the Goat Races gives CCBRT the chance to profile its work as a recipient of some of the proceeds of the fundraising event. This year the team publicised our work in advocacy, with interactive stations allowing visitors to get a taste of how it would be to experience the Goat Races in the same way as a person with a disability. Guests tested

wheelchairs, learnt sign language and were blindfolded and given a white cane to experience the Goat Races with a visual impairment.

The 10 million TZS received from the Goat Races will fund the provision of assistive devices. CCBRT provides assistive devices to reduce the dependency level of children with cerebral palsy, enabling them to participate in every day activities.



KfW announces 8.5m EUR grant to CCBRT Maternity and Newborn Hospital

In May CCBRT, the Ministry of Finance and KfW, the German Development Bank, signed an agreement worth 8.5million EUR towards the construction of CCBRT Maternity and Newborn Hospital. The announcement coincided with a visit from a German Parliamentary delegation to CCBRT. Signed by the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry



of Finance, this agreement shows clear support from the German Government and KfW for the Public Private Partnership between the Government of the United Republic of Tanzania and CCBRT. This funding will go a long way to helping us to complete construction of the specialist referral centre for Dar es Salaam and the Eastern Zone of Tanzania, due to be complete in 2015.



Environmental strategy profiled at CCBRT



In May, a group interested in environmental conservation and sustainable energy visited CCBRT to hear more about our environmental strategy. Led by BORDA, the company responsible for the Decentralised

Wastewater Treatment System being built into the design of the CCBRT Maternity and Newborn Hospital, the guests were invited to learn more about how wind, rainwater and wastewater are all being utilised to generate/save energy at CCBRT as we aim to protect our environment and have a sustainable impact in a country with scarce resources.
